Physical Development

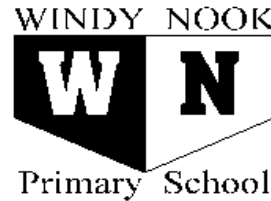
We will be learning to:

- Promote a flexible three finger tripod grip using a range of tools and activities
- mark make to develop the muscles in the hand and fingers.
- Use glue spreaders, scissors, pencils etc
- Practise good hygiene when using the toilet and before eating.

Literacy

We will be learning to:

- Join in with repeated refrains and anticipates key events and phrases in rhymes and stories
- Begin to be aware of the way stories are structured, and to tell own stories
- Make up stories, play scenarios, and drawings in response to experiences, such as outings
- Sometimes gives meaning to their drawings and paintings
- Recognises familiar words and signs such as own name, advertising logos and screen icons

Mathematics

We will be learning to:

- Compares two small groups of up to five objects
- Enjoy counting verbally as far as they can go
- Subitise one, two and three objects (without counting)
- Respond to and uses language of position and direction
- Responds to both informal language and common shape names

Understanding the world

We will be learning to:

- Show interest in the lives of people who are familiar to them
- Join in with family customs and routines
- Remember and talk about significant events in their own experience
- Recognise plants, animals, natural and found objects
- Use pipes, funnels and other tools to carry/ transport water from one place to another
- Knows how to operate simple equipment, e.g. turns on CD player, uses a remote control, can navigate touch-capable technology with support

Expressive arts and design

We will be learning to:

- Experiment with 3D modelling
- Experiment with colour/shades
- Explore and learn how sounds and movements can be changed
- Continue to explore moving in a range of ways, e.g. mirroring, creating own movement patterns
- Enjoy joining in with moving, dancing and ring games

RRSA Links

Article 2 All children have these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what their parents do, what language they speak, what their religion is, whether they are a boy or girl, what their culture is, whether they have a disability, whether they are rich or poor. No child should be treated unfairly on any basis.

Article 3 All adults should do what is best for you. When adults make decisions, they should think about how their decisions will affect children.

Article 12 You have the right to give your opinion, and for adults to listen and take it seriously

Article 13 You have the right to find out things and share what you think with others, by talking, drawing, writing or in any other way unless it harms or offends other people.

Article 14 You have the right to choose your own religion and beliefs. Your parents should help you decide what is right and wrong, and what is best for you.

Article 17 You have the right to get information that is important to your well-being, from radio, newspaper, books, computers and other sources. Adults should make sure that the information you are getting is not harmful, and help you find and understand the information you need

Characteristics of learning

Playing and exploring – engagement

Showing curiosity about objects, events and people. Pretending objects are things from their experience. Initiating activities

Active learning – motivation

Showing a deep drive to know more about people and their world. Persisting with an activity or toward their goal when challenges occur. Showing satisfaction in meeting their own goals (I can!)

Creating and thinking critically – thinking

Thinking of ideas that are new and meaningful to the child. Making links and noticing patterns in their experience. Planning, making decisions about how to approach a task, solve a problem and reach a goal.
